

Bertrand Russell, 20<sup>th</sup> Century British philosopher and atheist, wrote, "Unless you assume a God, the question of life's purpose is meaningless."

Michael Phelps is once again the golden boy of Olympic Games, achieving unparalleled success in athletic achievement. In a recent interview on ESPN (Google it – it is worth hearing), Phelps talked about losing his way and hitting bottom after the 2012 Olympics. As he explains, it was in the pages of a Christian book,

The Purpose Driven Life by Rick Warren (the Men's Group read and discussed this book a few years ago), that Phelps found a new belief in a "higher power" and "a greater purpose than myself." He had to look beyond himself and his achievements for meaning and purpose.

The Christian faith is all about finding that higher power and that greater and ultimate purpose in life. Instead of settling for a vague, undefined and impersonal higher power however, the Bible proclaims and portrays a personally involved God who comes to his creation

Jesus Christ and lives with his people in his Holy Spirit and who promises resurrection and unending life with him beyond this world. Those who follow his way find meaning in all of life, good and bad, and ultimate purpose in the Creator's purposes.

Perhaps you are searching for purpose and meaning, and perhaps you have even hit bottom. You won't find it in the things of this world and life (read Ecclesiastes). You will find it in the Creator of the world and the Lord and Savior of all life. When we find we have lost our way, as we all do, I learned from one of my teachers many years ago to pray the simple prayer, "O Lord, renew my purpose." I pray that today for myself, for our church, and for each and every one.

## New Clarksburg History to Benefit Library

The newest, most comprehensive history of Clarksburg ever produced will be unveiled and made available for sale for the first time at the annual Wines of Clarksburg on Sunday, September 18, beginning at 1 p.m. The 174-page highly illustrated book will sell for \$30 each, with all of the net proceeds being donated to support the Clarksburg Library. After September 18, the book, which is entitled *Clarksburg: the Water, the Land, and Its People*, will be available at the Clarksburg Library.

Ted Smith, the author of the new history, has spent the past ten years on this project. And he says that without the help and support of people throughout the Clarksburg area, he simply would not have been able to publish the document. He is very grateful to all of them.

Mr. Smith's document recounts the history not only of the Plains Miwok Indians who lived in Clarksburg from approximately 500 A.D. to 1833 but it also examines the histories of all those who have called this area "home." He provides historical accounts of all the people and organizations that reclaimed the land in the four districts that comprise the Clarksburg area: Glide, Lisbon, Holland, and Merritt. In addition, he provides histories on Clarksburg's library, churches,

schools, fire department, farming, governance, and community organizations.

When asked why he undertook such a project, Ted said that Clarksburg and the people that he has come to call "friends" have been exceedingly good to him and his family for over the last 42 years, and this was his way of saying "thank you."

## A Spiritual Reflection

Dear Friends,

Last week, I had the wonderful opportunity to vacation in my hometown, visiting my parents and many extended relatives over the 4th of July. It was a gift to visit home and see a number of people (as many as we could cram into a brief visit) who watched me grow up and encourage me in my life still. So was being in Clarksburg (town of around 500 residents) for the 4th of July. They do it up for the holiday with community band, red, white and blue flags from tree to power poles, and a parade that people joke if you blink you might miss (though this year it was quite robust with entrants, I have to say).

While I loved the llamas, and decorated bicycle of children, and antique cars, and fire trucks, my favorite piece of this year's parade was a sculpture that would be installed at the "triangle" (translation, town common for New Englanders) the next day. Roger Berry, local sculptor, created the piece that you see in the picture. What you can't see is the way that this sculpture changes when you approach it from a different direction. If you stand before it, it is a circle (you can see that). If you stand to the side, it creates a triangle. I did not have time to explore it more, but I imagine there may be more shapes that emerge when the viewer places herself in dif-

ferent locations. I also love that it is a connected/closed/encircling piece that does not seem to have a beginning or end, perhaps as sign of eternity or connectivity.

I've been thinking of Roger's work quite a bit since returning home and wrestling with the sad national news of these recent days. I have been sorrowing and feeling at a lack for words (hence, no Spiritual Reflection last week). I keep coming back to his work, symbol that we often view things differently depending on our perspective, and that we are connected even in our difference. I hope and pray that as we journey together as people and as a nation, we may find hope, perspective, opportunities for meaningful dialogue, and healing as we grieve senseless loss of life and divisiveness we have been experiencing.

While I cannot suggest that I can see from God's perspective, but I imagine/see that God weeps with and for us for the violence we inflict upon one another when we are called first and foremost to love.
